Dr. Bruce Carlson, MD, PhD

Dr. Carlson, both a biomedical researcher and a lake biologist, will discuss how a north country lake, like Gull, is influenced by factors such as climate and aquatic invasive species (AIS) and how they interact with native plant and animal communities to produce the lake we currently experience.

Dr. Carlson is Professor Emeritus and former Chairman of the Department of Anatomy and Cell Biology at the University of Michigan. Along with 200 papers, he has authored more than 20 books on regeneration, embryology and lake biology and has edited another 15 symposium volumes and translations. He is a well-known lake ecologist who focuses on how

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS), climate and fish habitat are impacted throughout the seasons as documented through the use of underwater videos. Dr Carlson was formerly a fish biologist and recently directed a 10-year study on northern pike with the US Geological Services. His retirement activities include speaking and writing books such as his 2023 release "A North Country Lake throughout the Seasons" and "Understanding Midwestern Aquatic Invasives" in 2024. Dr Carlson is a frequent speaker and a former President of the Ten Mile Lake Association in Hackensack and will be available for signing copies of his book during the Gala event.

6. Do not cast towards loons on the water or nesting. Move fishing spots if loons are near or going for your line. If you hook a loon call Loon Rescue, Inc, 715 966-5415 and 715 453-4916.



2. Stay at least 200 feet away from nesting loons so they don't feel threatened and abandon their nest.



7. Do not shoot fireworks off over the lake. Fireworks are very alarming for loons! Chicks may be separated from parents in the chaos. The explosions can injure loons and chicks.



3. Lead poisoning is the leading cause of deaths. Just one lead sinker or jig can kill a loon! Please use lead-free tackle. Learn more and find sources for lead-free tackle at www.pca.state. mn.us.



8. Seek and follow guidance from GCOLA's Loon Conservancy Committee and DNR Minnesota Loon Restoration Project staff before building and deploying an artificial loon nesting platform. (DNR approved platform pictured.)



4. Watch ahead and use caution when boating and jet skiing near loons. Boat and jet ski strikes injure and kill loons. Always assume they will NOT dive! Loons will not dive out of the way when protecting chicks on their backs or on the water. Chicks cannot dive out of the way.



5. Discard broken fishing line properly. Please pick up fishing line and tackle you see in the water or caught in vegetation so loons do not become entangled.

Last fall, swimmer's itch was a big problem in some Crow Wing county lakes. We would like to determine how widespread the problem is on the Gull Lake chain. If you have experienced swimmer's itch this year, please send your name and address to Robert Eliason at gcola.endofdock@gmailcom. I will put the results of this survey in our fall newsmagazine. Note: There are anti-swimmer's itch products available to put on the skin before going in the water. They are advertised to prevent swimmer's itch.


Per the CDC, most cases of swimmer's itch do not require medical attention. The following may provide relief:

- Use corticosteroid cream
- Apply cool compresses to the affected areas
- Bathe in Epsom salts or baking soda
- Soak in colloidal oatmeal baths
- Apply baking soda paste to the rash
- Use an anti-itch lotion

Remember: Waterfowl promote the presence of swimmer's itch along your shore as shown in the graphic below. DO NOT FEED WATERFOWL!

- Friday, July 12



Several people have already volunteered to be Firefly Watchers. Now is your chance to be a Firefly Watcher this summer. What does a Firefly Watcher do? On a warm summer's evening between now and September as the twilight turns to darkness, a Watcher turns off all lights and sits either outside on a deck or inside in a screened in porch. The primary purpose of a Watcher is to enjoy the ambience of the darkness, which makes the evening's endeavor fun with or without fireflies! A watcher does this throughout the summer whenever in the mood. I am asking Firefly Watchers, if they see a firefly, to make a note, and then send an email to me. 


Since my last Government Relations update, there has been a flurry of activity around the country regarding enhanced wakes. Here are a few highlights:

- We are awaiting the imminent results of phase two Saint Anthony Falls (SAFL) research on enhanced wakes. Phase two focuses on the impact of prop wash on lake bottoms and the harmful effects such as scouring lake bottoms, creating algal blooms, adversely impacting fishing habitat, and resuspending harmful substances such as mercury from lake bottoms. Work on SAFL phase three research has also begun which will take a holistic view of factors impacting a lake's ecosystem with an anticipated 2025 completion date. Phase three is funded primarily through Minnesota State lottery funds via a grant from Minnesota's Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund.
- As I mentioned in the last newsmagazine edition, Vermont approved the nation's most comprehensive restrictions on wake boats and wake sports on Vermont's inland lakes and ponds. The new rules, which will take effect in 2024, impact 43 of Vermont's 73 lakes and stipulates that enhanced wake sports must operate 500 feet from shore in no less than 20 feet of water.
- Closer to home, Michigan House Bill 5532 would restrict the operation of wake boats to 500 feet or

- more from shorelines or docks and at water depths of 20 feet or more to minimize potential harmful impacts to swimmers, non-motorized watercraft, shorelines, and docks, and on fish and wildlife.
- Wisconsin Senate Bill 1077 required the University of Wisconsin systems to conduct a wake surf boat study. This study looked at a variety of factors including impact on lake bottoms, fish habitat, aquatic vegetation, sediment disruption and wave energy created by winds and storms versus waves generated by enhanced wakes. Over 75% of Wisconsin residents surveyed voted in support of legislation enacting statutes prohibiting creation of artificial wakes on lakes under 1,500 acres. For lakes over 1,500 acres, wake sports would be allowed if conducted at least 700 feet offshore and in at least 20-foot depths.

In a major in-state development, a Cook county Minnesota based lake is in final discussions with the DNR regarding their petition for wake surf restrictions. These restrictions stipulate that wake surf boats operate 500 or more feet offshore at a minimum depth of 15 feet. A final decision and announcement are expected any day now. Finally, DNR efforts are continuing to create a Watercraft Operators License since the 2023 Legislative passage of the bill.



- DRAIN bilge, ballast, wells & buckets before you leave the area.
- DRY equipment before launching watercraft into another body of water.



The environmental committee needs new members. Several previous members have moved on to chair other important GCOLA committees, which leaves room for some new members who have an interest in things our association can do to continue to protect and monitor our lakes' water quality along with other activities which enhance our shorelines and lake life in general.

Current activities sponsored by the environmental committee include:

Water quality testing (aka the End-of-Dock) program. Volunteers assist with a program to gather water samples from a network of more than 30 people who have signed up to gather samples twice a summer from the end of docks. These samples are then submitted to a water testing laboratory. The data from the lab is collected and presented to GCOLA members each year in the newsmagazine with a graph showing the trends for the past several years.

Firefly Watchers program. A volunteer for this program would solicit members, through an article in the spring/summer issue of the newsmagazine. You would record the observations from the Firefly Watcher volunteers' emails and write up the results each year.

Swimmer's Itch program. A volunteer for this program would put an article outlining the cause of swimmer's itch in the summer issue of our newsmagazine and also ask members to report via email any problems with this which they may have experienced. Write up an article with data and any interesting observations about preventions or treatments which may be successful.

Other topics of interest to you which may fit under the umbrella of GCOLA's environmental committee. Give it a try for one summer and see what a difference you can make!

YOUR LAKE ASSOCIATION IS WORKING FOR YOU

Aquatic Invasive Species Committee (AIS)

- Coordinates with the City of Lake Shore Police Department to provide watercraft inspections for invasive species.
- Conducts two inspections at 24 locations to look for AIS.
- Donates annually to the University of Minnesota Aquatic Invasive Species Research Center (MAISRC) for zebra mussel research.
- Fulfills AIS prevention needs including establishing a boat power wash station at the USACE public access ramp.

Communications Committee

- Maintains a website, a member group email service and social media to provide timely communication.
- Issues four newsmagazines per year to keep members informed about association programs and important issues affecting the Gull Lake Chain.

Environmental Committee

- Monitors water quality of our lakes and stream inlets through quantitative chemical analysis. Samples are collected by GCOLA volunteers and analysis completed by a licensed environmental laboratory.
- Measures water quality during the summer by secchi disk readings taken by GCOLA volunteers.
- Promotes star gazing and northern lights viewing through educational initiatives on light pollution.

Finance/Audit Committee

- Oversees the GCOLA AIS Fund with BLACF, the Gull Chain Preservation Endowment Fund with Initiative Foundation and the AIS Contigency Fund which provide long term funding for fighting and eradicating AIS.
- Manages and provides oversight of finances and audit process.

Fisheries Committee

- Attends annual Avid Angler discussion led by DNR and local fishing guides and outdoor media.
- Stays informed on fishery-related research from the University of Minnesota AIS Research Center.

Gala Committee

 Plans and executes annual fundraising Gala, including silent auction, trip raffle, and event sponsorship.

Government Relations Committee

- Works with state legislators, the DNR, state agencies, and local government units on lake issues and concerns.
- Works with other lake associations, county COLAs, and state-wide lake-related organizations on common legislative priorities.

Lake Steward Committee

- More than 185 lakeshore owners working to protect our lakes with 97 Lake Steward awards to date.
- Provides funding for approved shoreland naturalization projects.
- Conducts a Tree Giveaway each spring to promote naturalization of shoreland to protect water quality.

Loon Conservancy Committee

- Conducts a yearly loon count in the spring and late summer.
- · Educates boaters on loon-safe boating practices.
- Promotes the Get the Lead Out loon safe-fishing program.
- Supports loon reproduction activities including loon nesting platforms.

Membership Committee

 Conducts membership development programs to recruit and retain individual, family, and business memberships.

Safety & Recreation Committee

- Purchases, installs, and maintains one of the premier navigational buoy systems (100 buoys) in the State of Minnesota. We also install more than 20 no wake enforcement buoys for the sheriff's department.
- Provides free maps, with boating rules and regulation, at three public landings.
- Partners with Cass and Crow Wing County sheriffs to provide free boat safety training for approximately 75 youth per year.
- Works with county sheriffs on safety and enforcement issues including donations for night vision equipment, a range finder, and life jackets.
